If so, please consider the ENACT study.

What is the ENACT study?

Prostate cancer patients with early-stage and less aggressive cancer often choose an active surveillance plan to avoid the side effects of prostate cancer treatment. This means the cancer is carefully monitored and if it progresses the doctor will start active treatment.

ENACT is a clinical research study that is looking at whether a medication called enzalutamide is safe and able to delay disease progression in men who have chosen active surveillance.

Am I eligible to join?

You may be eligible for the ENACT study if you:

- Are currently on or are considering active surveillance
- Have been diagnosed with localized prostate cancer in the past 6 months
- Have had no prior treatment or surgery for prostate cancer

There are additional criteria that you need to meet to join the study. Your study doctor will assess whether you meet all of the study entry criteria.

Why should I participate?

Current treatment options for localized prostate cancer include surgery and radiation therapy, which can have sexual and urinary side effects. By participating in the ENACT study, you could help researchers find more options for patients like you.
